How To Write & Harmonize Original Riffs



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
Key: C minor Tempo: 80 BPM Chords needed: Cm, Gm, Eb Video Tutorial: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=GFokvj7Abks

Step 1: Choose a key and look up all the chords in that key. You can do this simply by googling the informiton. When I google "chords in C minor" I am provided the following chords, with the 7th extensions in parenthesis.

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i - C minor (C minor 7)
iidim - D diminished (Dm7b5)
III - Eb (Eb major 7)
iv - F minor (F minor 7)
v - G minor (G minor 7)
VI - Ab (Ab Major 7)
VII - Bb (Bb7)
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These chords all sound good together, expriement with them and create your own progression, I chose Eb, Gm, Cm

Chord Shapes:



After chosing my progression the next thing is to develop a strum pattern


 The next thing to do is examine the notes of the scale and the chords and look for overlapping notes.

Eb - Eb, G, Bb Gm - G, Bb, D Cm - C, Eb, G C minor pentatonic - C, Eb, F, G, Bb Here is the C minor scale for refrence



The minor pentatonic is a great place to start but you aren't limited to the scale, for example you will that the G minor chord has a D note, which is note in our minor pentatonic scale, you can use that D note in the riff, it is okay. The notes outside the pentatonic are more dissonant though, so use them sparingly if you choose to use them at all.

Resolution - This is that last note that you play in the idea, the last note is the most important note. You have resolution of phrases and resolution of the riff. The resolution of a phrase will be strongest if finished on a chord tone and the resolution of the riff sould be the root note of the scale. Meaning we should resolve the overall riff with a c note, but we have more options when resolving the prhases of the chords. I have chosen Eb, G and C to resolve my phrases with, the roote note of each chord, so the first thing we will do is play only that note on the first beat.



Next we will build a riff with 4 phrases, each less than a measure, resolving on these respective notes



Lets examine what happens when we do the same thing but we don't resolve these ideas on the root note, instead we resolve the Eb on the G note, the G on the F (the F comes fro the G minor 7, G-Bb-D-F) and C remains the same



Alright, time for you to go out and make your own riff! I wanted you to be able to do this exactly like we are doing but it is much more important that you are able to take these ideas and apply them creativily to create your own unique riffs and ideas.

You can use the free app "acapella" to record yourself playing one ukulele and then record yourself playing over it. This is a video app to so you can share these videos.
