1. What was your first fandom you ever joined (if you were into a fandom). Did you read fic for it? Have you ever written fic?

The Delicate Things We Make started with the story of a broken life. I felt compelled to tell it because I saw too much injustice suffered by women in silence in their day to day lives. The plot of the book evolved organically from there.

But because the story itself is tragic, I wanted Vivian to have an irrevocable happily ever after. And I wanted to give her what the world so often withholds from victims - justice and happiness.

The one I keep chasing and the one that stays elusive. If I ever do catch it, it's over for me. I'll be obsessed. You'll know when that happens, my socials will be full of it!

6. What is your favorite meal of the day?

I'm all about early mornings, so breakfast. Though I enjoy breakfast even for dinner.

7. If you could have dinner with one writer, dead or alive, who would it be?

I don't think I could. The potential for embarrassment is too great.

8. In A Whisper of Solace, you wrote from the ice queen point of view – which, as lovers of sapphic romances, we know you rarely find a book written entirely in that viewpoint. Tell us what that process was like. Why did you make that choice? Was it different from writing the "sweeter"/more open character majority pov?

Living in Neve's head was... an experience, but *Solace* is her story and she had to be the one to tell it, to live it, hence this wasn't really a choice that I had to make. Neve simply took over and that was that.

9. What is the best piece of advice about writing you've ever gotten?

"Don't!"

10. What book got you into reading?

Jules Verne got little Mila into reading adventure books about faraway islands and daring travelers. And Jane Austen in tandem with Charlotte Brontë got the slightly-older Mila into romance.

11. What book got you into reading sapphic romance?

Lee Winter and her wonderful *Brutal Truth* is solely responsible for me getting into sapphic fiction.

12. In *The Headmistress*, Sam and Magdalene had a life-altering night together before the book begins. Do you think, had that night never happened, that they would have still gotten together?

What's meant to be, will be... Yes, I think those two would have fallen head over heels for each other no matter how they met.

Magdalene and Sam are such a quintessentially fated couple. They are so different, hence they fit the opposites attract trope and yet they both possess a touch of mystery, which would've made them irresistible to each other.

Neve is the Ice Queen To Rule Them All.


b. Who is the softest for their love interest?
